



A number of 'Find a warm space' venues have opened up in the area. Full details are available on the Borough Council website, Burnley.gov.uk. All the venues provide warm drinks and light refreshments. Some provide newspapers, board games and crafts, use of computers and chatting areas and some people may break into song, once they have warmed up.

CLEANING TEAMS

We currently have three teams who rotate on a weekly basis to keep our church clean and tidy. 


