



900 years of children learning about Jesus. The style may have changed, the numbers attending may be different, but its value and relevance is just the same .



The Hiding Place

I am sure we have all at sometime played hide and seek. The childhood fun of scampering away to hide in a really good place just hoping that you would not be found! Well actually we all want to be found don't we? (Aren't we glad that Jesus the Good Shepherd keeps on looking for his lost sheep until he finds them?)

Bill and I lived for many years in Southern Spain, where the weather is not deemed to be extreme (Well if you discount from mid June to mid September then that is correct!) However if you move further west into the provinces of Cadiz Seville and Extremadura. the climate becomes much harsher. Colder in the winter and hotter in the summer. A couple of times we visited the province of Cadiz. Once we rented a cottage in a forest thinking it would be cool, but in actual fact we got

scorched just unpacking the car to take our luggage inside! When we went the couple of miles to the sea it was even worse, as the Atlantic sea breeze which we had thought would be cool was red hot. I like to think that there is a solution to every problem, so I begged Bill to go to a cheap bazaar and we bought him a long djellaba (a long dress) and a Bedouin like head scarf. I got a bright turquoise tunic with matching trousers which were both about 3 sizes too big, a pair of white cotton gloves and a huge straw hat. Thus suitably clad we headed down to the beach. When we had parked the car Bill decided to go down to see if there was anywhere shady enough in the rocks for us to sit. Meanwhile whilst waiting, I was accosted by two fierce looking policemen who came to tell me that we were illegally parked (alongside another 50 or so cars). I then explained that we were really just looking for some shade and fortunately for me Bill appeared looking rather like an Arab Sheik, and the policemen giving us both a strange look, and thankfully putting away the parking ticket book, decided to let us go on our way! he next beach was quieter and was blessed with gigantic rocks and these rocks became our refuge for the rest of the week.

There is a lovely verse from Isaiah 25. v 4.

For you have been a defence for the helpless, a defence for the needy in distress .

A refuge in the storm, a shade from the heat.

For the breath of the ruthless is like a rain storm against a wall.

Now as I am writing this I am reminded of how when I was in a very sick and confused state in hospital, I sought God through the Gideon's bible and how I kept repeating the verse from psalm 46. '

God is our refuge and strength a very present help in times of trouble'.

God has not only shaded me from the heat of the Cadiz sun, he has brought me through many of life's storms by His grace and persistent love.

I love the end of the verse from Isaiah which says 'for the breath of the ruthless is like a rain storm against a wall.'

Christians who secretly worship in fear of being persecuted or even sentenced to death for their faith. Women who are in refuges fleeing from domestic violence, and all

those who are seeking God's help in times of sickness or trouble. May they shelter under the shadow of His wing until He brings them to a new place of enlightenment peace and joy! Amen.


We need to look at how we can attract families from school. Do we need to go to them instead of expecting them to come to us?

Sage, bacon and parsnip linguine

INGREDIENTS

- 2 tbsp olive oil, plus an extra drizzle (optional)
- I tbsp butter
- small bunch of sage, leaves picked
- 2 tbsp capers, drained and rinsed
- 50g smoked bacon or pancetta, cut into thin strips
- 300g parsnips, peeled and cut into 6cm-long pieces, about 2mm thick

- 180g linguine
- 30ml dry sherry
- squeeze of lemon juice
- grating of nutmeg
- 2 tbsp grated parmesan, plus extra to serve
- I tbsp crème fraîche
- ½ orange, zested (optional)

METHOD:

- Heat the oil and butter in a frying pan over a medium heat, until the butter has
 melted and is sizzling, then fry the sage for a minute or so until darkened and slightly
 translucent. Transfer to a sheet of kitchen paper using a slotted spoon. Set aside
- Fry the capers in the pan for 1-2 mins until puffed and crisp be careful as they may spit. Transfer to the kitchen paper with the sage using a slotted spoon
- Add the bacon or pancetta to the pan with a drizzle of oil, if the pan is dry. Fry until the fat has been rendered out and the bacon is just starting to colour. Add the parsnips and fry for about 5 mins until softened and turning golden at the edges.
- Cook the linguine in a pan of boiling water following pack instructions, or for about 8-9 mins, until just cooked.
- Meanwhile, pour the sherry over the parsnips and bacon, and simmer until the alcohol has almost entirely evaporated. Season with salt and a squeeze of lemon juice only a few drops, so as not to overpower the dish. Season with a good grating of nutmeg, then stir in the parmesan. Add a ladleful of the pasta water to the pan and stir until you have a creamy sauce. Drain the pasta and set aside.
- Stir the crème fraîche into the sauce and simmer until slightly reduced. Add the fried capers, sage and the linguine, then toss to combine. Heat everything together for I-2 mins, then remove from the heat, season well with black pepper, and divide between plates. Top with extra parmesan and a grating of orange zest, if you like.
